Course Description

This online self-learning course invites students without prior knowledge of German to explore some basic features of the German language and culture through a virtual journey. Based on texts, audio and video input, and interactive tasks, students will be able to practice both spoken and written German. This course serves as a taster course for students who might consider taking German courses at CUHK in the future.

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, students are expected to be able to

- understand basic features of the German language;
- understand selected information related to German culture;
- identify "international" loanwords (e.g. "kindergarten") as a helpful means to understand vocabulary;
- recognise the relationship between English and German in terms of vocabulary;
- apply basic structures to simple everyday situations, e.g. greetings, introducing oneself and others, expressing food preferences and dislikes, and talking about hobbies;
- implement independent learning as part of their learning experience.
