Course Code & Title:	<b>GERM3020 German Conversation</b>	
Language of Instruction:	German / English	Units: 3

Course Description
<p>This course aims to enhance students' oral communication skills in German, and to a minor extent written communication. Through selected student-oriented stimuli and topics related to social issues and contemporary affairs, students will practice the expression and exchange of personal views and ideas. Classroom activities may include in-class activities such as dialogue, role-play, narration, speech, group discussion, debate and multimedia activities. Emphasis will be placed on oral practice and an interactive learning environment with a view to helping students build confidence and develop fluency in using the language, to speak spontaneously in social interaction and acquire conversational techniques commonly used in a German-speaking environment.</p> <p>→ The prerequisite for this course is GERM3000 (2002), 3001, 3002, 3050 (2010) or 3051 (3010).</p>

Learning Outcomes
<p>Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• express his/her opinion in discussions and use appropriate techniques of verbal expression;</li> <li>• write and/or perform short dialogues suitable for everyday situations;</li> <li>• assess the quality of oral statements and make suggestions for improvement;</li> <li>• introduce topics of personal interest to third parties by applying digital media.</li> </ul>

Assessment Scheme		
Task nature	Description	Weight
Participation and oral expression	Oral expression covers in-class participation, which may be in the form of Q & A, dialogue and role-playing exercises.	10%
Homework / short video	Apart from a minor amount of homework, students submit a short video in which they introduce themselves.	10%
Final Video Project	In groups, students produce a video on any topic related to Hong Kong that they would like to share with their classmates.	30%
Presentation	There is one assessed presentation to be held in class on a topic chosen by the student(s).	25%
Oral exam	Test in pairs/groups for 10 minutes: dialogue and discussion.	25%
