Course Description

This is a summer intensive German language course for beginners, covering the full syllabus of GERM1000 and 2000. This course is only open to students who have not studied German before.

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to deal with some simple daily situations in German such as

- greeting somebody and exchanging basic personal information;
- talking about family, profession, nationality and language abilities;
- naming furniture and everyday items; describing materials, colors and forms;
- talking about free time and weekend activities.
- talking about food and dishes;
- talking about their daily routine and past activities;
- asking for directions and giving instructions;
- giving details of an apartment and assess a house and a living area in a city;
