Language of Instruction: French / English	Units: 3	

Course Description

Building on the knowledge acquired in FREN1000, this course aims to further develop students' ability to communicate in French in various everyday situations. It also seeks to give students a taste of French culture and invites them to explore cultural differences. Through intensive practice students will develop more confidence in interacting in French while further expanding and solidifying their understanding of the basic grammar and pronunciation patterns.

Prerequisites: FREN 1000 or equivalent competence.

Learning Outcomes

After taking this course, students are expected to be able to:

- (1) Master basic communication skills such as doing shopping, getting information about the time or a flat, asking for directions and transportation.
- (2) Be able to travel in a French speaking country, buying train tickets and getting information about accommodation and activities.
- (3) Talk about one's daily activities and habits.

Task nature	Description	Percentage
Participation	Punctuality, active participation. Occasional homework (details given in class).	10 %
Listening test	In-class listening test. Students will listen to a dialogue/dialogues and answer questions about it/them on an answer sheet.	30 %
Written Expression	In-class writing task (approx. 200 words, 30 minutes), on a topic related to the lessons content.	30 %
Oral expression	The oral test takes place on the last day of the course. Students will come at a given time-slot to the classroom by pairs. Pairs and time-slots will be decided earlier in the term. The test will last less than 10 minutes and will include 2 parts.	Part A: the teacher will ask questions to each student (with or without document). 15 %
		Part B: role play (for 2 students): students will interact on a random topic. 15 %

- Students are fully aware that their work may be investigated by AI content detection software to determine originality.
- Students are fully aware of the AI approach(es) adopted in the course. In the case where some AI tools are allowed, students have made proper acknowledgment and citations as suggested by the course teacher.

Assignments without a properly signed declaration will not be graded by teachers.

Only the final version of the assignment should be submitted via VeriGuide.

The submission of a piece of work, or a part of a piece of work, for more than one purpose (e.g. to satisfy the requirements in two different courses) without declaration to this effect shall be regarded as having committed undeclared multiple submissions. It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.

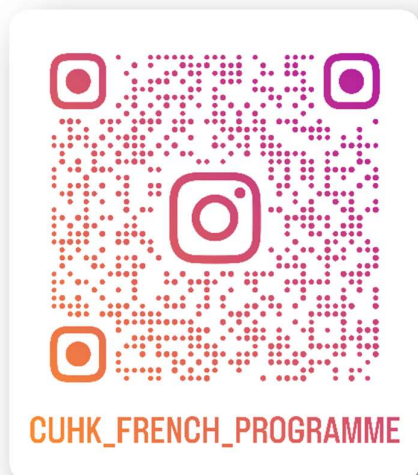
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Use of Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI) Tools in Teaching, Learning and Assessment
