Language of Instruction:	German / English	Units: 3

Course Description

This course builds on the knowledge acquired through previous German language courses. It aims at leading students to a proficiency level comparable to the threshold from A2 to B1 of the Common European Framework for Languages (CEFR), becoming “independent users” of German. To achieve this goal, students will be encouraged to work project-based through independent or collaborative work with their peers. At the end of this course students will have mastered the most important grammar features of German and be able to communicate effectively in a wide range of everyday situations and a number of professional contexts. They will be able to use their oral and written language skills to relate to, reflect on and analyse past and current issues involving the German-speaking societies.

This course is for students who have previously taken German V (GERM3001).

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to:

- talk about and comment on travel habits
- describe and evaluate the climate and weather of places
- talk about events and venues and convince people to go to one
- communicate on print media and on documents
- report incidents and ask about the circumstances
- talk about, describe and evaluate school systems, professional training and jobs
- discuss about working abroad, mobility and travel

Task nature	Description	Percentage
Participation and oral expression	Participation includes preparing for class, arriving on time, attending lessons and making active contributions during class, which may be in the form of Q & A, dialogues etc.	15%
Homework	Homework includes completing all exercises in the workbook, completing all mandatory tasks on the Moodle platform and worksheets and tasks distributed by the class teacher.	15%
Test 1	Details are given by the course teacher.	15%

Only the final version of the assignment should be submitted via VeriGuide.

The submission of a piece of work, or a part of a piece of work, for more than one purpose (e.g. to satisfy the requirements in two different courses) without declaration to this effect shall be regarded as having committed undeclared multiple submissions. It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.
