Course Description
<p>This course invites students without prior knowledge of Korean to explore the basic features of the Korean language. Supported by audiovisual aids, students will receive intensive practice in spoken and written Korean through interactive class work, homework and online exercises with special emphasis placed on oral communication and pronunciation. They will become familiar with the basic concepts of Korean grammar and learn how to interact in some simple everyday situations.</p>

Learning Outcomes
<p>Upon successful completion of the course, students should be able to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> (1) read and write the Korean alphabets (Hangeul) without much difficulties; (2) talk about topics such as everyday greetings, asking/giving information, shopping in Korean; (3) compare and interpret the current Korean society and its culture.
