

COURSE DESCRIPTION
Building on the knowledge acquired in SPAN1000, this course aims to further develop students' ability to communicate in Spanish in various everyday situations. It also seeks to give students a taste of Spanish culture and invites them to explore cultural differences. Through intensive practice students will develop more confidence in interacting in Spanish while further expanding and solidifying their understanding of the basic grammar and pronunciation patterns. (Not for students who have taken SPAN2050 2. Prerequisite: SPAN1000 or equivalent competence).

Task nature	Description	Percentage
Participation in class and homework	Active participation in class activities and regular homework. Continuous assessment.	15%

Notes:

- Students are required to arrive on time.
- Students are required to attend at least 75% of the class. Treat 75% attendance as the minimum, not the maximum.
- Should a student miss more than 25% of the class, he/she will automatically fail the course
- If a student is unable to attend, he/she should review the content and homework that are missed and make them up him/herself
- For missed tests, make-up tests will not be arranged unless the student can provide an official supporting document, such a medical certificate

It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. 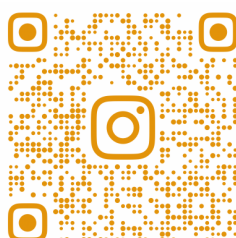
