## **Course Description**

This course is designed to present the French society and culture from a cross-cultural perspective. We will particularly examine the aspects of behavior, attitudes and customs of the French in modern France, as well as their image in the world. No prerequisites.

## **Learning Outcomes**

After taking this course, students are expected to:

- 1) Be able to discern the main cultural traits of France.
- 2) To think beyond stereotypes concerning the French.
- 3) To globally understand the French culture and to take a critical look on it.
- 4) To acquire some knowledge of some important cultural elements of classical and contemporary France, such as French food, wines, architecture, cinema, music, painting, photography, graphic novels and video games.
- 5) To have a better idea of the French-speaking area in the World and their cultural richness and diversity.

Only the final version of the assignment should be submitted via VeriGuide.

The submission of a piece of work, or a part of a piece of work, for more than one purpose (e.g. to satisfy the requirements in two different courses) without declaration to this effect shall be regarded as having committed undeclared multiple submissions. It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.
