Language of Instruction: English **Units**: 3

Course Description

Germany was a once divided nation with complex historical background and rich culture which continuously attracts international interest. This course investigates trends and developments in contemporary German culture and society from a cross-cultural perspective, taking into consideration the historical events of different generations in Germany. Students will be encouraged to compare and critically analyze the reflections about Germany and their own society. The course content will be presented by up-to-date audiovisual materials. No knowledge of German is required.

Learning Outcomes

The aim of this course is to let students explore different aspects of German culture and society and make them think about the source of behavior, customs and attitudes, while comparing with Hong Kong and Chinese behavior. The famous German poet Goethe included in his concept of culture clothing and food, history and philosophy, art and science, children's games and sayings, climate and landscapes, economy and literature, political and private life. Although the course cannot cover all aspects, it will give students an idea about German mentality and ways of thinking and refer them back to their own background. One needs to be aware of one's own background to discover the identity of the other. After taking this course, students are expected to have an understanding of Germany in regards to:

- (1) The perception of Germany & Germans (at home & abroad)
- (2) Geography
- (3) Holidays & Festivals
- (4) Women and Family
- (5) Education
- (6) History

German speaking countries (Germany & Austria): Classical / Modern / Pop / Techno, etc.; Religion in Germany; German design and architecture; The Berlin Wall; Tourism in Germany (e.g., German Fairy Tale Route; Castles on the River Rhine; etc.); History (e.g., King Ludwig II of Bavaria and his 'Disney' castles; the Iron Chancellor: Otto von Bismarck, etc); the social security net in Germany; German theatre; German media; German philosophy; German cinema (e.g. Neuer Deutscher Film; film schools in Germany, etc); Germany in the European Union; Museums in Germany (e.g. Berlin, Munich, etc); Flüchtlingskrise 2015 (refugee crisis); Abgasskandal (Dieselaffäre – and many more.

It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic.
