

Course Description

This course introduces the phonetic system of the Korean language. Supported by audiovisual aids, students will understand the sound of the vowels and consonants, the pronunciation rules and the intonations in different contexts of the Korean language. The articulation of some Korean sounds that are more difficult for Chinese speakers will also be examined. Through interactive classroom learning activities, students' accuracy of Korean pronunciation will be enhanced. Pre-requisites: KORE3000,3001,3002,3050 or 3051

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- (1) produce the sound of each vowel and consonant accurately;
- (2) identify phonetic rules and apply them to pronunciation properly;
- (3) reduce pronunciation errors;
- (4) produce rhythmically correct sentences;
- (5) identify meaning-change through intonation;
- (6) speak accurately and fluently;
- (7) ultimately increase self-confidence in speaking.

Participation	This considers students' attendance, in-class active participation, etc. (1) attendance (50) (2) in-class active participation (50)	10%			
Homework	Recording homework will be allocated in order to reinforce school learning. Students are required to record their voice reading the provided materials and submit the audio file on Blackboard.	15%			
Team Project	This is a video dubbing project involving teams of three members at different proficiency levels. (1) Select a scene(s) (not less than 12 mins) from Korean TV drama or movie and submit the video clip. (10) (2) Prepare the script in Korean. (10) (3) Dub the muted video clip into Korean. (50) (4) Conduct peer evaluations through secret ballot; each team member will be evaluated by the other team members and teams. (30)	25%			
Speaking exam	The speaking exam will assess the accuracy of students' pronunciation and intonation. Students will deliver a short presentation (not less than 5 minutes) on the given topic.	25%			
Final exam	This is a written exam covering the pronunciation rules taught during the term.	25%			

Notes:

- Students are required to arrive on time.
- Students are required to attend at least 75% of the class. Treat 75% attendance as the minimum, not the maximum. The success of learning will highly depend on attendance. If a student miss more than 25% of the class, he/she will automatically fail the course. In case of being absent, it is recommended to get informed about what content and homework missed and make it up.
- Students are expected to submit their homework, assignments, etc. on time. Late submission will cause mark deduction unless there is any justifiable reason.
- If a student is not able to attend any exam, he/she should inform the course instructor in advance and provide an official supporting document such as a medical certificate later on. Otherwise, they might not be granted a make-up exam.

- Students are fully aware of the AI approach(es) adopted in the course. In the case where some AI tools are allowed, students have made proper acknowledgment and citations as suggested by the course teacher.

Assignments without a properly signed declaration will not be graded by teachers.

Only the final version of the assignment should be submitted via VeriGuide.

The submission of a piece of work, or a part of a piece of work, for more than one purpose (e.g. to satisfy the requirements in two different courses) without declaration to this effect shall be regarded as having committed undeclared multiple submissions. It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.
