Language of Instruction: English Units: 1

Course Description

This course is for students without prior knowledge of French to discover some aspects of the French culture along with some basic elements of the French language. With the support of audio-visual materials, short textual information, different interactive tasks and online tests, it aims to help students get familiar with practical and cultural aspects of daily life in a French-speaking environment. It serves as a taster for students who might consider taking three-unit or six-unit French courses offered by the French programme of CUHK in the future.

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, students are expected to be able to:

- understand some basic features of the French language;
- interact in simple French in daily contexts, e.g., greetings, ordering food in a restaurant, expressing preferences for the food, etc.;
- learn French independently as part of their learning experience.

Unit 6: Bonnes fêtes ! (Happy Holidays!)	(Write down your name, your first name and your address.) -Introducing a person to a friend and thanking for an invitation: Voici un ami. (Here is a friend.); Je te présente. (I introduce (her/him) to you.), Enchanté (Nice to meet you), Merci pour l'invitation! (Thanks for the invitation!); Avec plaisir! (With pleasure!) - Asking questions about a holiday: C'est comment, le Nouvel an en France? (How is New Year's Day like in France?), Et les activités? (And what about the activities?), Et demain soir, tu vas où? (And tomorrow night, where do you go?), La Saint-Valentin, en France, c'est quand? (Valentine's Day, in France, when is it?); Avec qui? (With whom?), Et on fait quoi? (And what do we do?) -Talking about what people do in general (during a holiday): On mange (We eat), on danse (we dance), on boit (we drink), on s'embrasse (we kiss each other), on va dans un bar (we go in a bar), on sort au restaurant pour un dîner en amoureux (we go out for a romantic dinner), etc.	Introduction of the New Year celebrations in France: the customs, the activities, the food and drinks and the greetings used during that event. Introduction of the celebration of Valentine's Day: the date, the activities, the expression frequently used and the gifts frequently offered.

- The submission of a piece of work, or a part of a piece of work, for more than one purpose (e.g. to satisfy the requirements in two different courses) without declaration to this effect shall be regarded as having committed undeclared multiple submissions. It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.
