Course Description

As the second in a series of six language courses, this course invites students who has taken Italian I or equivalent, to explore the features of the Italian language further. Supported by audiovisual aids, students will receive intensive practice mainly in speaking and listening the language but also in some reading and writing Italian through interactive class work, homework and exercises. They will become familiar with the main concepts of Italian grammar and learn how to interact in some simple everyday situations.

Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course the students will be able to have a correct pronunciation of the language, as well as getting familiar with its different basic features. They will be able to have a basic conversation and oral understanding about various everyday situations such as talking about their house, the activities in their free time and what they like and dislike, etc. The same skills will be developed for the written language (reading and writing) but the focus will stay on the oral skills; The course will also give the learners some knowledge of Italy, its culture and lifestyle.
