Course Description

This course builds upon the foundation established in previous Korean language courses. To accomplish this objective, students will be motivated to engage in project-based learning through independent or collaborative work with their peers. By the end of the course, students will have attained proficiency in essential Korean grammar structures and possess effective communication skills applicable to various everyday situations and professional contexts. They will be capable of utilizing their oral and written language abilities to connect with, contemplate, and analyze historical and contemporary issues relevant to Korean-speaking societies.

Pre-requisite: KORE3001 or equivalent competence.

Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the course, students should be able to

- (1) enrich overall proficiency with a wider variety of vocabulary and expression used in daily lives;
- (2) use indirect sentence patterns and complex sentences which contain many subordinate clauses;
- (3) enhance their proficiency of reading comprehension: read and understand sophisticated written text faster and better;
- (4) improve listening skill learning by increased audio-visual materials during class.

Assignments without a properly signed declaration will not be graded by teachers.

Only the final version of the assignment should be submitted via VeriGuide.

The submission of a piece of work, or a part of a piece of work, for more than one purpose (e.g. to satisfy the requirements in two different courses) without declaration to this effect shall be regarded as having committed undeclared multiple submissions. It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.
