### **Course Description**

This course invites students without prior knowledge of Russian to explore the basic features of the Russian language. Supported by audio-visual aids, students will receive intensive practice in spoken and written Russian through interactive class work, homework and online exercises. They will become familiar with basic concepts of Russian grammar and learn how to interact in some simple everyday situations.

### Learning Outcomes

After taking this course, students are expected to:

- present basic personal information & introduce themselves. •
- express their opinion and give arguments. •
- be able to use Russian language in order to provide basic needs while traveling in any Russian speaking country.
- comprehend major linguistic features of Russian language. •

Only the final version of the assignment should be submitted via VeriGuide.

The submission of a piece of work, or a part of a piece of work, for more than one purpose (e.g. to satisfy the requirements in two different courses) without declaration to this effect shall be regarded as having committed undeclared multiple submissions. It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.
