Language of Instruction: Spanish / English	Units: 3	

Course Description
<p>Building on the knowledge acquired in SPAN1000, this course aims at further developing students' ability to communicate in Spanish in various everyday situations. It also seeks to give students a taste of Spanish culture and invites them to explore cultural differences. Through intensive practice students will develop more confidence in interacting in Spanish while further expanding and solidifying their understanding of the basic grammar and pronunciation patterns.</p> <p>(Not for students who have taken SPAN2050. Prerequisite: SPAN1000 or equivalent).</p>

Task nature	Description	Percentage
Participation & homework:	Active participation in class, punctuality and regular homework (continuous assessment).	15%
Midterm test:	Test covering reading and listening comprehension, grammar and vocabulary, and writing expression.	25%
Final written exam:	Exam covering reading and listening comprehension, grammar and vocabulary, and written expression.	30%
Final oral exam:	Production: oral production about a randomly generated topic (2-5 min.). Interaction: dialogue in pairs about a randomly assigned topic (2-5 min.).	30%

Notes:

- Since the success of your own learning will highly depend on your attendance, **you are required to arrive on time to the lessons.** Two late attendance events, 20 minutes or more, will be considered as one absence.
- **You are required to attend at least 75% of the class.** Treat 75% attendance as the minimum, not the maximum.
- **Should you miss more than 25% of the class, you will automatically fail the course.**
- If a student is unable to attend, he/she should review the content and homework that are missed and make them up him/her-self.
- **For missed tests/exams, make-up tests/exams will not be arranged unless the student can provide an official supporting document, such as a medical certificate.**

Assignments without a properly signed declaration will not be graded by teachers.

Only the final version of the assignment should be submitted via VeriGuide.

The submission of a piece of work, or a part of a piece of work, for more than one purpose (e.g. to satisfy the requirements in two different courses) without declaration to this effect shall be regarded as having committed undeclared multiple submissions. It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.

Use of Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI) Tools in Teaching, Learning and Assessment

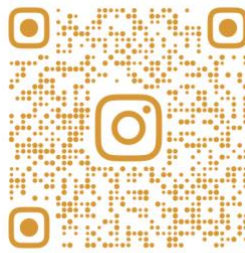
All use of AI tools is prohibited in assignments and assessment tasks.
