Course Code & Title:	SPAN 3050: SPANISH LANGUAGE III & IV	
Language of Instruction: Spanish /English		Units: 6

Course Description

This is an intensive Spanish language course, covering the full syllabus of SPAN2001 and SPAN 3000. This course aims at increasing students' communicative fluency in oral and written Spanish. Therefore, students will receive intensive practice in spoken and written Spanish through interactive class work, homework and online exercises. Students will further develop their abilities in the four Spanish language skills (listening, speaking, reading and writing). Through intensive practice, they will be able to understand everyday phrases and common Spanish expressions covering topics especially relevant to them. It goes one step deeper into the introduction of the Spanish speaking countries' society and culture. **Prerequisite: SPAN 2000 or SPAN 2050.**

Learning outcomes

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- Talk about their daily routines.
- Describe clothing and talk about the weather.
- Talk about their plans.
- Talk about food and ordering at a restaurant.
- Describe their homes and talk about the parts of the house.
- Talk about the past.
- Talk about their experience as students.
- Talk about their learning process and describe their study environment.
- Go to the doctor's office, describe medical symptoms, ask for treatment and recommendations.
- Buy medicines in the pharmacy.
- Describe past events, talk about how things were in the past and compare them to the present.
- Narrate a story including descriptions, actions, and events.

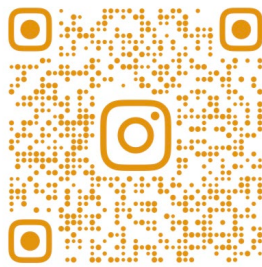

The submission of a piece of work, or a part of a piece of work, for more than one purpose (e.g. to satisfy the requirements in two different courses) without declaration to this effect shall be regarded as having committed undeclared multiple submissions. It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.
