

#### **Course Description**

This course is designed to provide an introduction to Korean culture and society by exploring Korean history, culture, politics, and economy through lectures and discussions from interdisciplinary and cross-cultural perspectives.

#### **Learning Outcomes**

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- (1) Have a basic understanding of Korean history and the key issues of contemporary Korean society;
- (2) Understand the underlying cultural and religious roots of Korean people's behavior;
- (3) Analyze issues and phenomena in Korea from a cross-cultural perspective.

#### Notes:

- Students are required to arrive on time.
- Students are required to attend at least 75% of classes. Treat 75% attendance as the minimum requirement, not the maximum. The success of learning will highly depend on attendance. Students who miss more than 25% of classes will automatically fail the course. In case of absence, it is recommended to get informed about what content and homework missed and make it up.
- Students are expected to submit all homework, assignments, etc. on time. Late submission will result in mark deductions unless a valid reason is provided.
- If a student is unable to attend any exam, they must inform the course instructor in advance and provide official supporting documentation (e.g. medical certificate). Otherwise, a make-up exam may not be granted.

- Students are fully aware of the AI approach(es) adopted in the course. In the case where some AI tools are allowed, students have made proper acknowledgment and citations as suggested by the course teacher.

Assignments without a properly signed declaration will not be graded by teachers.

Only the final version of the assignment should be submitted via VeriGuide.

The submission of a piece of work, or a part of a piece of work, for more than one purpose (e.g. to satisfy the requirements in two different courses) without declaration to this effect shall be regarded as having committed undeclared multiple submissions. It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from

one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.
