Course Description

This is the second of a 6-term long language course which provides basic training in spoken and written Korean, oral practice for various everyday situations and essential grammatical structures. It also gives a general introduction of the Korean society and culture.

Pre-requisites: KORE1000 or equivalent competence.

Upon successful completion of the course, students should be able to:

- (1) talk about daily activities in present or the past;
- (2) ask and explain the reason for doing or not doing something;
- (3) understand the current Korean society and its culture.

Notes:

- Students are required to arrive on time.
- Students are required to attend at least 75% of classes. Treat 75% attendance as the minimum requirement, not the maximum. The success of learning will highly depend on attendance. **Students who miss more than 25% of classes will automatically fail the course.** In case of absence, it is recommended to get informed about what content and homework missed and make it up.
- Students are expected to submit all homework, assignments, etc. on time. Late submission will result in mark deductions unless a valid reason is provided.

- If a student is unable to attend any exam, they must inform the course instructor in advance and provide official supporting documentation (e.g. medical certificate). Otherwise, a make-up exam may not be granted.

Academic Honesty and Plagiarism

Assignments without a properly signed declaration will not be graded by teachers.

Only the final version of the assignment should be submitted via VeriGuide.

The submission of a piece of work, or a part of a piece of work, for more than one purpose (e.g. to satisfy the requirements in two different courses) without declaration to this effect shall be regarded as having committed undeclared multiple submissions. It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.
