Language of Instruction: Spanish / English	Units: 3	

Course Description

Building on the knowledge acquired in SPAN1000, this course aims to further develop students' ability to communicate in Spanish across various everyday situations. It also seeks to provide students with a taste of Spanish culture and invites them to explore cultural differences. Through intensive practice, students will gain more confidence in interacting in Spanish while expanding and solidifying their understanding of basic grammar and pronunciation patterns.

Note: Not for students who have taken SPAN2050. Prerequisite: SPAN1000 or equivalent).

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Talk about food.
- Describe a dish and its ingredients.
- Order at a restaurant.
- Buy food at the market.
- Describe a city and its main attractions.
- Ask for and give directions.
- Request tourist information.
- Make travel reservations.
- Talk about experiences while on vacation.
- Lodge a complaint.

- Assignments without a properly signed declaration will not be graded by teachers. Only the final version of the assignment should be submitted via VeriGuide.

The submission of a piece of work, or a part of a piece of work, for more than one purpose (e.g. to satisfy the requirements in two different courses) without declaration to this effect shall be regarded as having committed undeclared multiple submissions. It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.

Use of Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI) Tools in Teaching, Learning and Assessment


All use of AI tools is prohibited
