Course Description
This is a summer intensive Korean language course, covering the full syllabus of KORE3001 and 3002 which builds on the knowledge acquired through previous Korean language courses. It aims at leading students to 'independent users' of Korean. Through selected student-oriented stimuli and topics related to social issues and contemporary affairs, students will practice the expression and exchange of ideas and personal views. Classroom activities may include dialogue, role-play, narration, speech, group discussion and debate in direct approach or using multimedia. Lively oral practice and an interactive learning environment will help students to build language confidence and fluency, to react spontaneously in social interaction and acquire conversational techniques commonly used in a Korean-speaking environment.

Learning Outcomes
At the end of this course students will have mastered the most important grammar features of Korean and be able to communicate effectively in a wide range of everyday situations and a number of professional contexts. They will be able to use their oral and written language skills to relate to, reflect on and analyze past and current issues involving the Korean-speaking societies.

Participation	This considers your attentiveness, punctuality for class time, active participation in class, and continuous assignments. (1) in-class active participation (30) (2) attendance (30) (3) Homework (40)	10 %
Mid-term Exam	Mid-term exam consists of Listening, Vocabulary and Grammar, Reading, and Writing. It covers from Unit 7 of Active Korean 3 to Unit 3 of Active Korean 4.	25%
Assignment	Students will have four Assignments. Assignment sheets will be uploaded in the Blackboard once every three units. Students are required to submit each assignment on time. Late submission won't be accepted or cause mark deduction unless you have justifiable reasons.	20 %
Oral Exam	The oral exam consists of two parts. (1) Oral Exam will be conducted individually face to face with the teacher. (70) (2) Students are required to submit a video recording of a presentation about the given topic.(30)	15 %
Final Exam	The final exam consists of Listening, Vocabulary and Grammar, Reading, and Writing. It covers from Unit 4 to Unit 9 of Active Korean 4.	30%

Notes:

- Students are required to arrive on time.
- Students are required to attend at least 75% of the class. Treat 75% attendance as the minimum, not the maximum.
The success of learning will highly depend on attendance. If a student miss more than 25% of the class, he/she will automatically fail the course. In case of being absent, it is recommended to get informed about what content and homework missed and make it up.
- Students are expected to submit their homework, assignments, etc. on time. Late submission will cause mark deduction unless there is any justifiable reason.
- If a student is not able to attend any exam, he/she should inform the course instructor in advance and provide an official supporting document such as a medical certificate later on. Otherwise, they might not be granted a make-up exam.

It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.
